THE MENNONITE CHURCH began during the Reformation in Northern Europe in the 16th century as part of the Anabaptist (re-baptizers) movement. Currently there are over one million members world-wide. Mennonite beliefs and practices vary widely, but following Jesus in daily life is a central value, along with peacemaking. Menno Simons was an early prominent leader and eventually the group became known as "Mennonites" because of his name. (For more information, visit www.mcusa.org)



- art gum erasers

Workshop History:

The first Quilting Workshop was held in 1973. It was started because of a renewed interest in quilts and quilt making. At that time, there were few quilting classes available, but many people eager to learn. Since a quilting group had met at Zion for about 70 years, we were in a unique position to share quilting skills.

We want to share our knowledge as a service to others, not as a way to raise money. However, at the first workshop, many people asked if they might make a donation. So each year since, we have designated a mission project to which donations could be made. This year, donations will be accepted for the Senior Center in El Torno, Bolivia The Senior Center has served as the community/social center for the village since it was built in 2001. It is a place where the elderly of El Torno can go for fellowship, food, teachings, occupational therapy, health care, and rest.
