New book arrivals: For children and teens:

- Cowboy Small by Lois Lenski
- The Forty Acre Swindle by Dave and Neta Jackson. This story of a 14 year old boy inspired by the teachings of George Washington Carver is another adventure story introducing 8-12 year olds to Christian heroes of the past.
- The Power of a Praying Teen by Stormie Omartian shows how learning to pray can make a difference in your life including freedom from peer pressure, standing against bad influences and being able to forgive others.
- Sophie's Secret and Sophie's Stormy Summer are two books by Nancy Rue in the Faith Girlz series.

General Reading:

- Cure for the Common Life Max Lucado gives much-needed advice on transforming the everyday into a discovery of self, God and eternal meaning. The book is a celebration of the life each one is given. A book to read if you feel like you're sliding through life instead of soaring as God intended for you to do.
- Light fromHeaven Author of the Mitford series, Jan Karon includes themes and characters, old and new, and answers questions asked since the series began in this last--and best--trip to Mitford.

- Gardenias for Breakfast is a novel by Robin Jones Gunn about grandmothers, mothers and daughters.
- Katie's Last Book is a combination of Yoder family history, family recipes and recollections of her family's trip from Iowa to Oregon and back by Katie Yoder Lind.
 Editors that concluded her story include our own Margaret Shetler.
- The Secret Message of Jesus is a reflection by Brian D. McLaren on the teachings and actions of Jesus in which he challenges the reader to ask what it would mean to truly live the message of Jesus today.
- Several of *The Little Books of Justice and Peacebuilding* by various writers including the subjects of negotiation, circle processes, trauma healing and Biblical justice.
- Teaching Peace: Nonviolence and the Liberal Arts -- This is a collection of essays by various contributors, with one attempting to define violence and nonviolence; another writing about the Bush doctrine and pacifist pedagogy in a post-September 11 world.
