Have you been too busy this summer to read? Well, 'Tis the season' to prepare for those rainy, cool evenings when curling up with a good book can take you to sunny places, adventure and history. It's also a good time to begin exploring the shelves in your church library to find those gems that provide inspiration, broaden your knowledge of church and local history, or just pure enjoyment. There are many noted Christian and Mennonite authors whose names you will recognize. You will also find most of the various translations of the Bible along with many good commentaries and other resource material.

As noted in the library's annual report, circulation this past year was about half of last year's. So if you enjoy reading we hope you will avail yourself of the wonderful opportunities for reading that the library provides.

The following are some of the books that have been newly added:

- SLEEP IN PEACE is a children's book by Ingrid Hess that received the 2008 Church and Synagogue Library Association's Rodda award for best book in children's literature. This book was published by Herald Press. The repeating phrase "God loves you sweet child, Sleep in Peace" assures the child that God watches all children as they sleep.
- LOST SONS by Judy Clemens is an artful interweaving of the story of the son of a fictional police detective with the true facts of Clayton Kratz's disappearance in Russia while working with MCC in 1920. It is set in Goshen, IN.
- TREASURE HUNT is a Shenandoah Valley mystery by Eunice Geil Smith. In 1949, eleven year old Maggie stumbles across her grandfather's Civil War diary leading her to investigate a family secret hinted at in its pages. Though written for the younger reader it proves to hold interest for adult readers as well.

- SHATTERED DREAMS -- This book describes the life of the author, Irene Spencer, as a polygamist's wife and her endurance in abject poverty while suffering the neglect of a husband with divided loyalties. In the end she and her children found their way into a life of truth and redemption through faith in Christ.
- *EMERALD ANGEL* is a novel by Wilma Derksen that is an imaginative creation conveying truths about living at peace with God and humankind. See Janis Burkhalter's review in the November FOCUS.
- MAKING SENSE OF THE JOURNEY: THE GEOGRAPHY OF OUR FAITH -- You may recognize many names of the various Mennonite writers in this book who share their memoirs about the changes that time brought into their lives. Edited by Robert and Nancy Lee. Robert became a Christian while attending the Portland, OR Mennonite Mission.
- MENNONITES, AMISH, AND THE AMERICAN CIVIL WAR by James O. Lehman and Steven M. Nolt. During the American Civil War, Mennonites and Amish faced moral dilemmas testing their core of faith. These authors provide an account of the Anabaptist experience during the bloodiest war in American history.
- PLAIN DIVERSITY: AMISH CULTURES AND IDENTITIES by Steven Nolt and Thomas Meyers explores the diverse culture found in 19 settlements in Indiana. The authors share their finding of a common identity in the absence of uniformity with an insightful analysis that can relate to the broader Amish settlements throughout America.
- Lauraine Snelling's *RETURN TO RED RIVER* series has been donated and added to the library.
- Three sets of THE SALESIAN TRILOGY books are full of poetry and colorful pictures. You will find them in the poetry section. The following is a poem from the Salesian Trilogy book "A Song Within My Heart":
