LOOKING ON – LINE

I am curious about many things, especially about the Bible and about books that I read. Our library has commentaries and Bible dictionaries and even the works of Jewish historian, Josephus, to refer to. I recently enjoyed reading the Apocrypha.read.

I also like to write down the title and author of the AQUOTE books I read. I began doing this in 2006 and have read approximately one book a week since then. That is around 572 books in eleven years. As I review the titles I have no idea what some were about, but others I remember well. One I remember and liked best, could be called "my book of the year" is: IAm Malala by Malala Yousafzai.

We have some older books in our library and it is sometimes hard to know when it is time to remove them. Are they too outdated, torn, falling apart, have bad print, or poorly written?

As I was browsing through the children's books, I came across some old books that are quite valuable.

Yonie Wondernose by Marguerite De Angeli. This is a first edition (1944) and is currently valued at \$125.00

Little Lost Lamb by Golden McDonald and Leonard Weisgard. This is a 1945 hard cover edition valued at \$199.99

Everybody Has a House and Everybody Eats by Mary Mc Burney Green, a 1950 edition at \$45.95.

So we know that old does not necessarily mean that it needs to be thrown away or that it has lost its value, we need to be careful in our judgement of the books we have available to us.
